LEARN MORE ABOUT YOUR WILD NEIGHBORS

On the Edge invites the public to attend a free program to learn more about their wild neighbors who live in communities on the urban/wilderness edge on Thursday October 20th at 7 p.m. at the Whittier Center Theater, Whittier Community Center, 7630 S. Washington Ave., Whittier, CA 90605. The event will feature wild animals native to the Mountains of Southern California including owls, a hawk, opossum, raccoons, a lion and others. Participants may take home original publications specifically designed to offer informed lifestyle choices for residents who live in communities next to wilderness areas.

Why care about wildlife and habitat? A healthy ecosystem that sustains wildlife reduces incidence of disease, provides clean air and water and lessens the probability of wildlife conflicts. With information and action, homeowners can help ensure the safety of families, pets and livestock. People can enjoy living next to wilderness without having nature move into their homes. And residents can maintain a community's wilderness character for many years and generations to come.

On the Edge is a collaboration of existing organizations and agencies with goals to promote public understanding about the value of wildlife and habitat, to offer ways to reduce the human-wildlife conflicts, and to encourage lifestyle changes that foster stewardship of our natural heritage.

This event is being sponsored locally by the Puente Hills Landfill Native Habitat Preservation

Authority (Habitat Authority), established to acquire, restore and maintain open space in the Puente Hills

as a permanent protection for the native habitat. To date, the Habitat Authority manages approximately

- Nature of Wildworks provides lifetime quality care for non-releasable wild animals and gives
 educational programs that foster respect and concern for the fragile status of Southern
 California's wildlife.
- Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area is a cooperative effort by the National Park Service, California State Parks and Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy to preserve the scenic, natural and historic resources of the Santa Monica Mountains.
