Steve Huber from Whittier Area Audubon provided an update on the Beginners Bird Walk. Two CTAC members were a part of the walk. The bird walk will cease for the summer and restart in September.

A verbal update and presentation was provided by Deputy Chief Ranger Hughes from the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority.

#### Recommendation:

That the Board receive and file 2024-25 workplan and activities.

#### Background:

Attached is the Authority's end-of-the-year update of the agency workplan for fiscal year 2024-25, its summary notes, and the Restoration Workplan. The format of the agency workplan in general does not reflect routine day to day and core functions of staff's time which essentially support the mission of the agency. Due to workload, a prolonged staff vacancy, unexpected happenings, and circumstances beyond control, progress on a few of these items is not at the level previously estimated or anticipated.

The highlights of the agency workplan are: Measure PH passed, 16 presentations, 3 open houses, anniversary celebration, closed out two grants, and was awarded two grants (\$9,000 and \$4.9 million).

The Authority workplan and day-to-day Authority mission-driven tasks are in accordance with the attached Authority's Strategic Planning Guidelines, which set priorities for the agency core functions. Below are year-end highlights of four of the agency's core functions: outreach and involvement, resource management, preserve management and administration.

#### Public Outreach and Involvement:

Per the Authority's Strategic Planning Guidelines, the agency has historically been committed to providing high quality opportunities for outdoor learning and community involvement. For FY 24-25, as in recent years, outdoor education and interpretive programming were not prioritized, and outdoor school programs did not occur at previous levels due to ongoing staff vacancies.

Currently there are approximately 20 engaged volunteers that the Authority has retained since cutting programs due to the pandemic and losing staff due to financial challenges. The Habitat Authority engages several types of volunteers, including Docents, Trail Watchers, and day-of-

event helpers. In FY 24-25, the Habitat Authority tracked 740 volunteer hours, representing and in-kind value of approximately \$29,707. Chart A, below, illustrates the volunteer hours donated over the past five years and a summary since FY 2010-11. Volunteer participation this past year primarily included bi-weekly hikes in Powder Canyon and trail watching. In years past, volunteer participation primarily included summer outdoor education for toddlers, outdoor educational programming for elementary school students, and a variety of specialized events. The first volunteer docent training effort was in the spring of 2009. Since record keeping began in fiscal year 2010-11, approximately 28,475 volunteer hours have been tracked, equating to approximately \$824,352 in value to the Authority's efforts.

Chart B, below, illustrates a truncated compilation of estimated participants reached from outreach efforts since 2001. Records from the years 2020 to present are primarily estimates due to reduced staff capacity to track as accurately as had been done in the past. Over 880 visitors to the Preserve were offered docent lead hikes during FY 24-25.

#### Resource Management:

We are committed to promoting and protecting biodiversity in the Preserve. Main ecological activities this past year included beginning the Metro Heights in-lieu fee mitigation project, obtaining regulatory agency sign-off certifying completion of the Monterey and Southern California Edison mitigation projects, and submitting a manuscript for publication in collaboration with Whittier College. Restoration projects are on schedule and budget, and at the end of FY 24-25, 37 acres were being restored. To date 285 acres in the Preserve have been fully restored. Attached is a detailed end-of-the-year restoration workplan report. Below is a summary of the revenue and acreage from the restoration program. Overall, the mitigation restoration program has attracted between \$20 to \$30 million of outside funding for the hills.

#### Preserve Management:

While protecting biodiversity remains the primary priority, the Authority is also committed to offering low-impact recreational opportunities so long as they are balanced with long-term ecological sustainability. Preserve management and safety was primarily accomplished via the various grant programs, fuel clearance, routine trailhead maintenance, trail repairs and the ranger/park services contract with the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA).

#### Administration/General Operations:

The Habitat Authority operates with minimal staffing and professional services support, employing only three full-time staff members. The Program Analyst position was vacant for over four months until filled in April. To supplement internal staffing, the Habitat Authority contracts with the City of Whittier for personnel services and with the County of Los Angeles for financial and investment support. Legal services are also obtained through contractual agreements. During the past fiscal year, the Habitat Authority executed 15 new contracts and four contract amendments to support its obligations and project implementation. Additionally, staff issued 11 special use permits this past year.

Staff continues to maintain organizational capacities and equipment for operations. Operations include but are not limited to document retention, accounts payable, technology services, the website, public records requests, vehicle and housing upkeep, insurance, audits, accounting services, and personnel services. Furthermore, over 478 payment request memos (a 58% increase from five years prior) were made to Los Angeles County (the Authority's Controller) and at least an additional 12 were made to City of Whittier to facilitate payment of credit card

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costs. Also, this year we facilitated the internal accounting transition process to QuickBooks. Lastly. unique website active users was at 40.3K, and of that amount 36.2K were new users.

The Authority strives to provide friendly and responsive service to the community. Staff responded to a variety of inquiries from local residents, addressing specific concerns as well as general inquiries related to trail hours and similar topics. Several house calls were made by rangers and staff when necessary, and many additional calls to the ranger emergency services phone number were fielded by the MRCA.

due to hazardous fire conditions.

#### Recommendation:

#### Background:

From:

At their May 20<sup>th</sup> meeting, the Riverside County Board of Supervisors approved the closure of six hiking areas (Exhibit A) in unincorporated areas of Riverside County following a request from CAL FIRE/Riverside County Fire Chief Bill Weiser. The areas, amounting to almost 64,000 acres, were selected for public safety and wildfire prevention based on factors such as increased risk of wildfire, relatively high traffic by recreationalists, and rugged terrain or topography that would make emergency response difficult. Of the six identified locations, all are now completely closed to recreation except for two: Ramona Bowl, which is open daily for recreational use from sunrise until 12:00 PM; and Whitewater Canyon near Cabazon, where the closure only applies to the surrounding hills used for hiking. Public access to the Whitewater Preserve, managed by the Wildlands Conservancy, and the Whitewater River remain open to visitors. The closure went into effect June 15<sup>th</sup> and will remain until further notice per a press release issued by CAL FIRE/Riverside County Fire Department (Exhibit B). Those violating the closure order may be subject to a minimum fine of \$100 for first-time offenses. Similar closures have previously been approved in Riverside County, including in at least 2024, 2023, 2022, and 2017.

The areas identified for closure in Riverside County are significantly larger and more remote than the Puente Hills Preserve. In contrast, Los Angeles County and the Santa Monica Mountains typically do not close recreational areas during hazardous fire conditions, likely in part due to the substantial cost of enforcement and patrolling.

When considering trail closures, there are two primary perspectives: one view suggests that maintaining public access promotes safety, as the presence of responsible users—acting as "eyes and ears"—can help deter illegal activity. The other holds that restricting access may reduce unlawful behavior by limiting opportunities for it to occur. Enforcement of trail closures when porous trail access conditions exist is a challenge. Law abiding visitors may obey signage, while security guards may be required to gain

full compliance. To address concerns about after-hours use and potential illegal activity, the installation of a gate at Turnbull Canyon Trail would help. However, porous conditions would remain throughout the Preserve. Currently, the Preserve is closed during red flag conditions when fire risk is most elevated. Should the Board choose to consider additional closures, it is recommended to consider gate and enforcement costs, as well as engagement in multi-agency collaboration, including the Los Angeles County Parks Department in part because trails are interconnected, and the Los Angeles County Fire Department. Furthermore, careful consideration of the grant and lease agreements that govern Preserve properties is recommended. These agreements have guidelines regarding public access in part as follows:

Section 3.9.1 of the Los Angeles County Proposition A Grant Administration Manual (GAM):

M&S Funds recipients must notify RPOSD when grant-funded facilities must be closed or restricted (partially or in its entirety) by an authorized agency due to health and safety risks, natural disasters, and acts of God.

#### From the Los Angeles County Measure A GAM:

Page 46: RPOSD must be notified in writing if there are ever any changes or impacts to the Measure A-funded project that will change the public's ability to access facility or project site. Including when the facility is closed or restricted from public use and access due to health and safety reasons including fire, flood, earthquake, or other natural disasters.

Page 15: Good Standing is required of all grantees to have payment requests processed and receive any grant funds from RPOSD. Good Standing is achieved and maintained when a grantee is in compliance with all requirements stated in the guidelines, policies, and procedures of RPOSD for both Proposition A and Measure A.


Management Agreement and Covenant Running with the Land between the County of Los Angeles, Los Angeles County Flood Control District and the Habitat Authority. (Hacienda Hills Trailhead)

The term of this agreement is 50 years, and is active to February 2055. The agreement states, "Habitat Authority shall have the right to close the property to the general public only in cases where public health and safety is of concern, including rules for fire closure and other emergencies, which are consistent with the policies of the Los Angeles County Fire Department."

#### FIRE CHIEF CLOSES HAZARDOUS HIKING AREAS THROUGHOUT RIVERSIDE COUNTY

RELEASE DATE: June 9, 2025

**PERRIS, CA –** CAL FIRE/Riverside County Fire Chief Bill Weiser recently received approval from the Riverside County Board of Supervisors to close six hazardous hiking areas throughout the region effective June 15, 2025. The closures will remain in effect until further notice in the following areas:

- Eagle Canyon/Tin Mine (east of Corona)
- Steel Peak (north of Lake Elsinore)
- Bautista Canyon (southeast of Hemet)
- North Mountain (south of Banning, north of San Jacinto)
- Whitewater Canyon (east of Cabazon)
- Ramona Bowl (south of Hemet) \*Open daily from sunrise until 12:00 P.M.

"In the interest of public safety and wildfire prevention, access to these hiking areas is temporarily restricted to protect nearby communities and reduce the likelihood of catastrophic fire events," stated Fire Chief Weiser.

Riverside County Ordinance 787.9 restricts public access to these identified hazardous fire areas unless private party access is required. Public roadway travel is permitted, providing travel is confined to those surfaces within hazardous fire area. Those violating the ordinance may be subject to a minimum fine of \$100 for first-time offenses.

Future closures may be implemented based upon weather conditions, fuel moisture and increased fire threats. Maps for each of the affected areas can be located at <a href="https://tinyurl.com/hikingclosures">https://tinyurl.com/hikingclosures</a>.

#### Background:

Attached for your review is the staff report from the Authority's June Board meeting. Below is a recap and update on the matter discussed in June:

- Recap: La Habra Heights: On June 9, 2025, and again in early July, a letter was mailed to a resident with aerial imagery illustrating that a road has been graded on adjacent Authority property and photographs that show vehicles that presumably used the graded roads on the Habitat Authority property to access the resident's backyard. We have asked the resident to remove all encroachments and return land alterations to their original conditions no later than July 31, 2025. The letter also detailed enforcement steps of the Habitat Authority's ordinance regarding encroachments.
- Update: On July 8, Deputy Chief Ranger Hughes met with the resident to begin discussions and resolutions. Staff plans to make a site visit before the Board meeting. There will be an update at the meeting.

Below is a summary of an additional encroachment discovered.

• La Habra Heights: Authority representative and contractor, Deputy Chief Ranger Hughes visited an Authority property in June and discovered an encroachment from a neighboring resident. This resident has previously encroached. On July 3, 2025, a letter was mailed to the resident with aerial imagery and photos illustrating the encroachment involving storing supplies, equipment, and astro turf on Habitat Authority property. We have asked the resident to remove all encroachments no later than August 5, 2025. The letter also detailed enforcement steps of the Habitat Authority's ordinance regarding encroachments. An update will be provided to the Board at a later date regarding this matter.

#### Fiscal Impact:

Excluding staff, ranger and legal services time, there are no fiscal impacts identified at this time.

Residents who sign up participate in a coordinated safety effort that includes a pre-holiday briefing and a dedicated patrol of Whittier's hillside trails and open spaces, areas particularly vulnerable to wildfires sparked by illegal fireworks. This boots-on-the-ground effort gives the community an active role in fire prevention and provides a real-time reporting mechanism for emergency response.

"Keeping our hills safe from fire danger is a shared responsibility," said Mayor Joe Vinatieri. "This partnership allows our residents to play a direct role in protecting Whittier and shows what's possible when cities and agencies work together toward public safety."

Whittier's approach highlights the value of interagency cooperation and grassroots prevention at a time when communities across California are grappling with increasingly destructive fire seasons. The City hopes the program can serve as a model for other jurisdictions looking to combine code enforcement, environmental stewardship, and civic volunteerism.

# Puente Hills Habitat Preservation Authority Awarded \$4.9 Million Grant for Wildfire Resiliency

Whittier, CA — In June, the Puente Hills Habitat Preservation Authority (Habitat Authority) was awarded \$4,977,000 in grant funding from the San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy (RMC), a state agency. The funding will support the Habitat Authority's Puente Hills Fire Resiliency project, which aims to enhance wildfire safety for the Puente Hills Preserve and the surrounding communities of Whittier, La Habra Heights, Hacienda Heights and Rowland Heights.

The state funding is sourced from the Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024, appropriations under Chapter 3 Wildfire and Forest Resilience. The three-year grant agreement, expected to be executed in August, has four primary tasks: A. Wildfire Prevention and Protection, B. Wildfire Prevention Planning, C. Biological Consulting & Contractor Oversight, and D. Acquisition.

Wildfire planning is multifaceted, encompassing everything from ignition prevention to emergency infrastructure and home hardening. This dynamic grant project will include exciting elements such as: home hardening for an agency facility; protective wrought iron boundary fencing at key locations; vegetation and hazardous tree clearance; habitat enhancement; equipment purchases including a flail mower, two 1,000 gallon mobile water trailers, and a 2,000 gallon water tender to be used for firefighting efforts; vegetation mapping; fire fuel modeling; land acquisition; and development of a permanent firebreak in the form of a trailhead.

Importantly, the grant allows the Habitat Authority to address critical wildfire resiliency activities that would otherwise not be covered under the agency's regular budget, which is funded in part by Measure PH. Letters of support for the grant were received from the City of Whittier, Sierra Club San Gabriel Valley Task Force, Friends of the Whittier Hills, and Hills For Everyone.

"We are extremely grateful to the RMC for their funding of this critically important grant. This proactive project is a part of the Habitat Authority's ongoing commitment to wildfire preparedness for the benefit of the Preserve and the local communities for years to come." said Ivan Sulic, Chair of the Habitat Authority's Board of Directors.

"This comprehensive grant provides us with the necessary additional resources needed to implement priority wildfire prevention and protection strategies, preserve natural habitats, and safeguard local communities. It's a win-win for the region." said Andrea Gullo, Habitat Authority Executive Director.

Since its establishment in 1994, the Habitat Authority has been committed to preserving and protecting the over 3,800 acres of natural habitats of the Puente Hills area, including Hacienda Hills, Turnbull Canyon, Sycamore Canyon, Hellman Park, Arroyo Pescadero, and Powder Canyon.
